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FRANK JOSEPH SHULMAN, a professional bibliographer, editor and consultant for reference publications in Asian Studies, is the author of twelve book-length bibliographies and scholarly guides on East, Southeast and South Asia, and a contributor to several journals and edited volumes. His latest works include "The Chinese Jews and the Jewish Diasporas in China from the Tang period (618-960 A.D.) through the Mid-1990s: A Selected Bibliography" (In *Jews of China*, Volume 2, 2000) and *Doctoral Dissertations on Hong Kong, 1900-1997: An Annotated Bibliography* (Hong Kong University Press, 2001).

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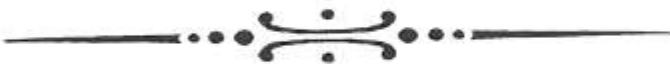
